Annual Parish Footpath Walking: This is always an enjoyable event when members of the Council and public join together, dogs too, and walk all four parish footpaths during the summer months. Any areas which need attention are reported to the Footpath Officer at Lincolnshire County Council, who works closely with the Council to ensure that safety is maintained. Why not join in the fun and walk along the footpaths to discover the local wildlife and beautiful scenery Tattershall with Thorpe has to offer.

Tattershall Thorpe Chapel: The New Life Church no longer use the Chapel and it has been put up for sale. We will have to wait and see what its future holds.

The HERS Scheme: After some delay the railings and gates have now been re-instated around the War Memorial in the Market Place and the design is very close to the original. A new bench with oak leaf and acorn design has also been installed in the Market Place.

Cleaning: The Councillors all work very hard cleaning, particularly the bus shelter in the Market Place, and litter picking around the village, and on occasion members of the public and children have helped along the way.

New Parish Council Office: A parish office was set up in August in Gartree Community School, next to the library, and the clerk can be found there on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings 9.00 until 12.00 and Thursday afternoons 2.30 until 5.30. If you have any queries or problems, do pop in to discuss them.

Competitions:

Best kept Village Competition was once again entered into by Tattershall and Tattershall Thorpe. Councillors and members of the public made a concerted effort to make both villages more attractive. Tattershall had a very good competition once again, but unfortunately didn't quite score enough to get through to the next round. Maybe 2007 will be the year for Tattershall. Tattershall Thorpe however won their class and were presented with a commemorative plaque.

The Best Kept Garden Competition is always a favourite as this competition is kept completely anonymous. The Rose Bowl Trophy is awarded annually to the winning garden in the 'Standard Garden' category, and the Barrack Trophy to the winner of the 'Container Garden' Category. This year the large garden category was won by Mr and Mrs S McDowell and the small garden by Mr. and Mrs. D. Kimsey. If you would like to have your garden judged for next year, start sprucing up your front garden and making

it look eye catching and well maintained. Who knows, there could be a judge looking at your splendour in the summer of 2007!!! Watch the notice board for results during August and September.

Coningsby and Tattershall Sports Forum

For the past 2 years a group of sport minded people have been meeting at the Allan Barker Sports Pavilion in Coningsby to try to develop sport in Tattershall. Tattershall Thorpe, Mareham-le-Fen, Kirkby on Bain, New York, Coningsby and Tumby Woodside. The group have members from many different sports but with one common goal, to develop an all inclusive sport programme for everyone whatever their age. East Lindsey District Council has provided a small grant to aid their volunteer work and to provide financial help to train new coaches for many local clubs and schools and to purchase new equipment. Coningsby Primary School has received new hockey goalkeeping protective clothing. Tattershall Primary School has new netball and football goal posts, Castle Bowmen have new bosses for archery. Bowling indoor mats and football goal posts have been purchased for other local clubs and the latest request is for New Age Kurling equipment. The Sports Forum is now promoting "come and have a go days" to encourage everyone to try a new sport which they hope will make clubs stronger and develop sport in the area. Manning Trophy:

The Manning Trophy for 2006-2007 was awarded to Tattershall Luncheon Club and was presented at the Annual Dinner. The Manning Trophy is awarded annually to the individual or organisation that in the opinion of the judges has made a significant contribution to the community worthy of formal recognition.

Parish Plan:

The Parish Council will be holding a public meeting in the Autumn to discuss the possibilities and merits of creating a Parish Plan. Lots of communities have taken on this vital task and it would be great to see Tattershall also having a go! A Parish Plan is a document which details the vision of how residents would like their village to be in the next 5 to 10 years. It's a way to get communities together to make decisions for themselves. Look out for posters giving details.

Chairman's Report:

The year commenced with the election of a new Chairman and Vice Chairman, Councillor Coulber and Councillor Pick respectively. Tracy Wall, the Parish Clerk, left her position in August after 7 years and handed over to Jean Girling who seemed to have settled in well. Jean moved into a new Parish Office adjacent to the library at Gartree School, from where she worked three days a week.

On a general note, the Council had met at 10 full meetings, all of which had been well attended. Training courses had been attended on many diverse subjects from burial grounds to planning and finance.

The guest speaker for the Annual Parish Dinner was the Lord of the Manor, Julian Kitchener Fellowes which was a great success.

The annual walking of footpaths during the summer attracted several members of the public and by and large the paths proved to be in fairly good order.

The HERS Scheme was extended for a further year, with more properties in the Market Place benefiting. The new railings were installed around the War Memorial in good time for Remembrance Sunday, also the new iron bench was now in position on the green, the old wooden one being removed for renovation. At last there was news of the footbridge over the River Bain that the Parish Council had for years campaigned to get reinstated. In fact the footings were laid

down during the winter and a brand new bridge should be in place sometime in the early summer.

This year the Best Kept Garden competition was won by Mr and Mrs Samuel McDowell for the larger garden and to Mr and Mrs Kimsey for the smaller garden category. Tattershall Thorpe also had their own separate competition for the first time and this was won by Mr and Mrs Hanson and the trophy was presented at the annual 'get together' of Meet the Neighbours 2 at Thorpe Camp.

Every year both Tattershall and Tattershall Thorpe had entered the Best Kept Village Competition to no avail. This year however, Thorpe pulled out all the stops and to everyone's surprise, including ourselves, managed to win. Our moment of fame was well publicised on TV, radio and in the press. Part of our prize was a tree and commemorative plaque. The tree planting ceremony took place in the autumn attended by a large number of residents.

Thorpe had also initiated a number of Neighbourhood Watch Schemes, which now cover the majority of the village.

A new parish notice board had been sited on Castlefield and a new dog waste bin had been placed on Clinton Park.

The Christmas tree lights survived the festive season unscathed.

The year had ended with the Parish Council election and a full compliment of fifteen candidates put up for nomination – quite a credit for the parish.
